Giving Feedback to Government: Report on L.A. Meeting, Galiwin'ku, 22nd May 2017

What: Local Authority Meeting

Where: Regional Council Office, Galiwin'ku

Date: 22th May 2017

1. Report on engagement and coordination between the Yalu' researchers and the Local Authority

Comments from Yalu' research team:

When we attended that meeting Danny Daŋataŋa (Chairman) and Diana Roper (CEO) knew we were coming, so everything went as planned. When we went into the meeting, Diana handed out the brochure (REC-IER information sheet) and explained to everyone we would be doing this work. Danny gave a presentation about the research. Everyone was happy to have us there. We had gone through the right channel instead of going the long way. Bobby, Danny the elders and Diana directed us, so went in and it was good. Everyone felt comfortable because we were welcome. Last week they had other (special) L.A. meeting but we didn't know about it, there was no announcement. We didn't go to do an evaluation because were doing volunteer work at the sports day and there was a ceremony.

Comments from CDU research team

The Yalu' researchers describe several key aspects of a successful introduction and engagement between themselves and the Local Authority:

- The relevant Yolngu and balanda authorities knew that they were coming
- They had gone through the right channel when seeking permission to attend
- They felt welcome

The coming together of these different aspects helped the researchers to do good work. Paying attention to these aspects of engagement is also relevant for Balanda working in the community.

2. Report from Yalu' research team on government engagement and coordination

Council Budgets

Summary from Yalu' research team

There was a presentation from Shane Marshall from the Shire talked about money, saying that there was a budget available for Galiwin'ku shire. The L.A. committee were asking to put a BMX track for the kids, and there were other funds available if Danny Daŋataŋa (L.A. Chairman) or the community wanted a park or recreational area, cyclone centre, swimming pool...

Comments from Yalu' research team

This was good, but what we were seeing is that they were talking about an issue for the community, not about individual choice. There should have been a way to involve the community instead of the Local Authority committee getting the story and keeping it there. It could be that in between L.A. and the community there is a gap that needs to be filled.

• Comments from CDU research team

For Yolnu, the relevant constituency to discuss or be involved in decision-making is not always the same. While the L.A. members are supposed to represent the community, sometimes it is difficult when their opinion is prioritised over discussions with other relevant people. There may need to be further consideration of appropriate mechanisms for decision-making and communication into and out of L.A. meetings and governance processes. This insight should be relayed to: East Arnhem Regional Council.

New Cyclone Shelter

Summary from Yalu' research team

They are putting a proper cyclone shelter in the community. This is because last year people went to the workshop, but there was a lot of risk – chemicals and in the workshop. At the meeting they talked about how contractors came into the community and they are building a large building opposite basket court. This is happening now.

• Comments from Yalu' research team

This was good engagement. Well-spoken balanda, with both Yolngu and balanda communicating and listening with each other. Most of the Yolngu are working with these contractors. Through Birrkpirrk people got training, and now with the cyclone shelter they have been given a proper job.

• Comments from CDU research team

Engagements around the new cyclone shelter at Galiwin'ku are going well. In part because people have a clear experience with what the problem has been and clear explanations of the solution to address them, also because it has demonstrated means for people to transition from training to employment. This insight should be relayed to: Department of Housing and Community Development.

Slow Build Project

Summary from Yalu' research team

The Slow Build houses were discussed at the end of the meeting. A man from the East Arnhem Shire based in Nhulunbuy spoke to the meeting about the Slow Build houses. He showed on the whiteboard screen the old mission houses. This was to go give a clear understanding for the committee members about the process of putting in those houses. They were telling the committee, so tenants moving into new houses can understand. Sometimes tenants are confused when they move out of the demountables, he was telling the committee so they can tell others. He was gave the L.A. numbers and diagram, showing how much money has been used for the new houses. Most of the slow build houses are

finished, and now there is a job to be done putting a fence around them. Staff will be coming in from Birrkpirrk, helping the contractors putting these fences around. This is including old houses built last year and the slow build houses.

Comments from Yalu' research team

The promises that the government made are happening, but we need to focus more on the future. The people who are working on this, will they keep doing this activity or will the government give them wages? The presentation was good, but can they concentrate and continue good engagement processes out in the field? There are two ways of communicating – inside the office, and out in the field. People in the LA meeting, talking about budget and talking, but outside people are doing the action. Both of these are part of engagement. Not just the people in the committee, but also those outside in the field.

Comments from CDU research team

Good engagement implies more than good communication. Yolnu in Galiwin'ku consider respectful interpersonal relations to be very important, but also often emphasise that community building is an important long-term goal that can be prioritised over the success or failure of specific face-to-face interactions. **This insight should be relayed to: NTG.**

Local Decision Making

It is minuted that Janine Bevis introduced the upcoming move towards local decision-making. However, the researchers have no notes of this and suggest they may have been busy with something else.

Comments from the Advisory Board and community members who attended the meeting:

Advisory board members: Bobby, Raylene, Danny, Rosemary, Evelyn Researchers: Stephen, Golung, Mitja, Beulah

 Members of the Advisory Board recorded a short video suggesting that any decision about budget spending on a new facility, it not only about the facility but also about how people can get jobs, who gets the jobs and how they can keep them. Learnings for the researchers:

Reflecting on this process, Stephen Dhamarrandji suggested that it would be helpful for the L.A. committee to hand out the scorecard at the next meeting so that committee members can fill it in then, rather than chasing around after them after the meeting has finished. This is a recommendation regarding handing over the responsibility for the evaluations – now the groundwork has been done – to government organisations or individual staff.
